

Youth in Nigeria Context

- Background
- •Youth are one of the greatest assets that any nation can have. Nigeria's population is predominantly young
- •Persons of ages 18 to 35, who are citizens of the Federal Republic of Nigeria is referred to as youth (Nigerian National Youth Policy, 2009).
- Youth Profile
- •Nigeria's total population in 2016 was projected to be 193,392,517 (NPoC July 2017). Youth population was estimated at 61,306,413 or 31,7% of the total population. This is one of the highest percentages of youth in any country.





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Issues Impinging on the Nigerian Youth



- Inadequate parental care;
- Non-availability of suitable sports and recreational facilities:
- Moral decadence in the society;
- Lack of appropriate role models;
- Religious fanaticism:
- Political manipulation of youth organizations;
- Unemployment and under-employment; Poor education;
- Breakdown of family values; and
- Indiscipline

- Since independence in 1960, successive Nigerian governments have initiated programmes and projects aimed at the youth.
- •Aim to shaping the character and behaviour of the youth, as well as promoting competitive spirit and national unity and integration.

Vision - The vision of the policy is to empowered Nigerian youths to fully realize their potentialities and positively contribute to the overall development of Nigeria

Mission - The mission of the policy is to build a youth with a sense of hope, self-confidence, imagination, creativity and pride in the nation's heritage; youth who represent hope in the future of Nigeria






